

2. Inside the Box

- Battery
- AC adapter
- Wired stereo headset
- USB sync cable

- Extra stylus


3. Getting to Know the HTC Touch Diamond2



Make sure your phone is turned off before installing the SIM card and battery. You also need to remove the back cover before you can install these components.


To remove the back cover

- 1. Make sure your phone is turned off.
- 2. Firmly hold the phone with both hands and the front panel facing down.
- Push the back cover up with your thumbs until it disengages from the phone and then slide it up to remove.



To install the SIM card

- 1. Remove the battery if it is installed.
- Locate the SIM card slot, then insert the SIM card with its gold contacts facing down and its cut-off corner facing out the card slot.
- 3. Slide the SIM card completely into the slot.



To install the battery


- Align the battery's exposed copper contacts with the battery connectors at the bottom part of the battery compartment.
- 2. Insert the contacts side of the battery first and then gently push the battery into place.
- 3. Replace the back cover.



To install a microSD™ card

Locate the storage card slot, then insert the microSD card into the slot with its gold contacts facing down until it clicks into place.

Note To remove the microSD card, press it to eject it from the slot



For information on how to remove or replace these components on your phone, refer to the "Getting Started" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

5. Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you start using your phone, it is recommended that you install and charge the battery.

To charge the battery

- Connect the USB connector of the AC adapter to the sync connector at the bottom
 of your phone.
- 2. Plug in the AC adapter to an electrical outlet to start charging the battery.

6. Starting Up

After installing the battery and charging the battery, you can now power on and start using your phone.

To turn on the power

Press the POWER button.


On first time use, the phone installs customized settings, and then displays the **SIM Card Changed** screen. Follow the on-screen instructions to import the contacts to your device.

To turn off the power

- 1. If the display is off, press the END/POWER button to turn the display back on.
- 2. Press and hold the END/POWER button for a few seconds.
- 3. Tap Yes when prompted.

7. The Home Screen

The Home screen of your phone allows finger-touch access to the most widely-used functions, such as People, Messages, Internet, and more. The Home screen has the following tabs::



To switch between the tabs of the Home screen

Do any of the following:

- Tap the desired tab on the Home screen.
- Press and hold your finger on the active tab, and then slide your finger right or left over the tabs. Release when you have selected the desired tab.
- Swipe left across the screen to move to the next tab, and swipe right across the screen to move to the previous tab.



The following sections in this Quick Start Guide will show you how to use some of the Home screen tabs. For complete information about using the Home screen, refer to the User Manual PDF.

8. Lock Screen

The Lock screen is displayed whenever your phone is locked. You can lock your phone to prevent accidental button or LCD display presses when the phone is in your bag or pocket.

When your phone is locked, you are still notified of new messages, missed calls, and upcoming appointments. You can also receive a call and adjust the phone volume when the phone is locked.

Locking and unlocking your phone

The phone is locked when the time out for a phone password has elapsed. You can also lock the phone manually.

To lock your phone

Press and hold the END button.

To unlock your phone

Slide the **Lock** button () left or right.

If you have locked the phone with a password, you will be prompted for the password when you unlock the phone.



Checking notifications when the phone is locked

You are notified of missed calls, new email and text messages, and upcoming appointments even when the phone is locked. The **Lock** button displays the number of notifications.

To view notifications

- On the Lock screen, tap the Lock button (). Notification buttons representing each type of received information, such as missed calls, new email, and new text messages, are then displayed below the Lock button.
- 2. Slide a notification button right or left to view the respective information. For instance, slide the Missed Call button () to access the Call History and view the missed calls.



Receiving a call when the phone is locked

You can receive and answer calls even when your phone is locked. After you end the call, your phone remains locked and the Lock screen is displayed. You need to unlock to use your phone.

9. Using the Start Screen

The Start screen gives you one-touch access to the programs and settings of your phone. To open the Start screen, tap **Start** () at the top left corner of the screen, or press the START button ().

On the Start screen:

- Swipe your finger up or down to scroll through the screen.
- Tap the **Today** icon to return to the Home screen. See "Home" in Chapter 3 for details
- Tap a program icon to open the corresponding program.
- Tap the **Settings** icon to access the settings of your phone.
- Tap Lock at the bottom-left corner of the Start screen to lock your phone. See "Lock Screen" for details.
- Press the START button to close the Start screen.



To move an icon to the top of the Start screen

You can move often used icons to the top of the Start screen for easy access.

- 1. Press and hold the icon that you want to move.
- 2. Tap Move to Top.

The icon is moved to the top of the Start screen.

To return an icon to its original location, press and hold the icon and then tap **Move Down**.

10. Making Your First Call

- 1. On the Home screen, tap Phone.
- Tap the keys on the keypad to enter the phone number.

Tip If you tapped a wrong number, tap • to erase each subsequent digit of a number. To erase the entire number, press and hold • .

- 3. Tap Talk to place the call.
 - **Tip** When in a call, use the VOLUME UP/DOWN buttons on the side of the phone to adjust the phone volume.
- When a call is in progress, tap End Call or press END to hang up.



Accepting or rejecting an incoming call

To answer a call

Press the TALK/SEND button, or fully slide the center button of the **Answer/Ignore** bar to the left.



To reject a call

Press the END/POWER button, or fully slide the center button of the **Answer/Ignore** bar to the right.



To mute the ring without rejecting the call

Tap Mute Ring or press the VOLUME DOWN button.

When you receive a phone call, tap **Send Text** to reject the call and automatically send a preset text message to the caller.

Note

To change the automatic text message that is sent to the caller when you reject the call, on the Phone screen, tap **Menu > Options > Advanced** tab.

11. Making a Video Call

On the Phone screen, tap the phone number to call, tap [24], then tap the **Video Call** button.

Notes

- The other party's image will appear on the screen about 3 to 5 seconds after a connection is established, depending on the signal strength. The streaming images quality may also be influenced by the signal.
- You need to use a 3G-enabled SIM card and activate the video calling service on your call plan to make video calls.

Changing the video call settings

On the Phone screen, or on the screen of the ongoing video call, tap **Menu** > **Video Call Options** and set the general video call and services options.



Note


While on a video call, you can change certain settings such as the size and brightness of the image, and the camera to use. Refer to the User Manual for details.

12. Entering Information

When you start a program or select a field that allows you to enter text or numbers, a keyboard icon will be displayed at the bottom center of the screen to indicate that the onscreen keyboard is available for use. Tap the keyboard icon to display or hide the onscreen keyboard.

Tap the **Input Selector** arrow that appears next to the keyboard icon to open a menu from which you can select different keyboard layouts and customize text input settings. You can choose from these keyboard layouts: **Full QWERTY**, **Compact QWERTY**, and **Phone Keypad**.

Note The available options on the input panel vary according to the region in which you purchased your phone.



To enter text, simply tap the keys on the onscreen keyboard. Depending on the keyboard layout selected, you may need to tap the same key more than once to select the desired character.

For more information about using the different input methods, refer to the "Entering Text" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

13. Basic Settings

Customize your phone settings to suit your personal needs.

Ringtone

- 1. Tap **Start** > **Settings**, and then tap **Sound**.
- 2. Tap **Ringtone**, select the desired ringtone in the list, and then tap **Done**.

Phone profile

A profile is a preset that determines how your phone will alert you when there are incoming phone calls. To select a profile:

- 1. Tap **Start** > **Settings**, and then tap **Sound**.
- 2. Under Profiles, choose one of the following: Normal, Vibrate, Silent, or Automatic.

Notes

- Automatic sets your phone to vibrate only when you receive phone calls during scheduled appointments in your Calendar.
- If you have set an alarm and you select the Vibrate or Silent profile, you will not hear the alarm sound when the alarm goes off.

Wallpaper

You can change the background image of the **Home** tab.

- 1. Tap **Start** > **Settings**, and then tap **Wallpaper**. The Album program opens.
- 2. Tap an image to set it as the Home tab wallpaper. If the image you want to use is not displayed, tap **Albums** and navigate to the folder where the image is located.

Alarm clock

- On the Home tab, tap the clock and then tap the Alarm tab (). You can set up to three alarms on this tab.
- 2. Tap an alarm time.
- On the Set Alarm screen, adjust the alarm time (hour and minutes), then tap the day of the week for the alarm.
 - **Tip** Select multiple days by tapping each desired day. Tap a selected day to exclude it from the alarm.
- Enter the alarm description, select the alarm ringtone, and then choose whether you want the phone to vibrate when the alarm goes off.
- Tap Done.

Phone lock

Enabling phone lock requires you to enter a password to unlock your phone after it has been left idle for a set period of time.

- 1. Tap Start > Settings, and then tap All Settings.
- 2. On the Personal tab, tap Lock.
- Select the Prompt if device unused for check box and choose the time to elapse before your phone requires password entry.
- 4. Select the Password type.
- 5. Enter and confirm the password and then tap **OK**.





SIM card PIN

Enabling the SIM card PIN requires you to enter a PIN number first before you can use the phone features of the phone.

- 1. Tap **Start** > **Settings**, and then tap **Communications**.
- 2. On the Comm Manager screen, tap Phone > PIN Code.
- 3. Enter the PIN, tap **OK**, and then tap **OK** on the dialog box.

Tips

- To change the PIN, tap **Change PIN** on the Phone Settings screen.
- Emergency calls can be placed at any time, without requiring a PIN.

Backlight and battery saving settings

Conserve battery power by adjusting backlight and battery saving settings.

- 1. Tap Start > Settings, and then tap All Settings.
- 2. On the System tab, tap Power.
- On the Backlight tab, clear the Auto adjust backlight check box, and then adjust the brightness for battery power and for AC power by dragging the battery power and external power sliders.
- On the Advanced tab, set when you want the backlight and phone screen to turn off when using battery and external power.
- **5.** Tap **OK**.

14. Adding Favorite Contacts

On the Home screen's **People** tab, you can add up to 15 favorite contacts. This allows you to quickly make calls, send text messages, and send email messages to contacts who you most frequently communicate with.

Note

The first time you access the People tab, **My Contact Card** opens and lets you enter and save your contact information. My Contact Card enables you to easily share your contact information with family and friends. Follow the onscreen instructions to complete My Contact Card.

To add contacts to your phone

Before you can add favorite contacts to the People tab, you need to add or import contacts to your phone's contacts list.

- On the Home screen, slide to the People tab, tap All People, and then tap New on top of the list.
- 2. Enter the contact information, and then tap **OK** to return to the Contacts tab of the People screen.

Tip If you want to import SIM contacts to your phone, tap Start > SIM Manager, tap Menu > Select All, and then tap Menu > Save to Contacts. (Copying SIM contacts to your phone results in duplicate contacts when you view them on the Contacts tab of the People screen).



To add favorite contacts to the People tab

- 1. On the Home screen, slide your finger to the **People** tab.
- 2. Tap one of the plus (+) icons, or tap Add Favorite.
- 3. On the Select a Contact screen, tap the name of the desired contact.
- 4. Select a phone number or email address to associate to the favorite contact.

Note If there is no picture assigned to the contact, the next screen allows you to select or take a picture of the contact.

To select a favorite contact on the People tab

- To flip through the contact pictures one at a time, swipe your finger upward or downward the screen.
- On the picture strip at the right side of the People tab:
 - Tap the picture of the desired favorite contact; or
 - Press and hold on the currently selected contact picture at the right side of the screen, and then slide upward or downward the picture strip until the desired favorite contact is selected.



Swiping upward/downward on the screen



Using the picture strip

To call or send a message to a favorite contact

- 1. On the Home screen, slide to the People tab.
- 2. Swipe your finger up or down the screen to scroll through the favorite contacts.
- 3. Tap an icon below the contact name to call or to compose and send a text or an email message to the contact.

The icons shown depend on available contact information. For example, (() will be shown if the contact's home phone is specified.



15. Viewing Conversations

Your Touch Diamond2 organizes all text messages, email messages, and calls that you exchanged with a favorite contact in a convenient interface.

On the Home screen, slide to the **People** tab, select the contact, and then tap the contact picture to open the Contact Details screen. Tap the tabs to view the contact details and all your conversations with the contact.



View all exchanged calls and call back.



View all received email messages and reply.



Communicate with the contact or edit the contact details.



View all exchanged text messages and quickly send a reply.

16. Sending a Text Message

Easily create and send SMS text messages from your phone.

- 1. On the Home screen, slide to the **Messages** tab and tap
- In the To field, enter the mobile phone number of the person you want to send the message to, or tap To to select a contact from your contacts list.
- 3. Compose your message and then tap Send.

For more information about composing and sending text messages, refer to the "Exchanging Messages" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

17. Sending an MMS Message

Create and send multimedia messages that contain pictures, videos, and audio clips.

- 1. Tap Start > Text.
- 2. Tap Menu > New > MMS, and then tap Custom.
- Enter the recipient's mobile number or email address in the To field and enter the message Subject.
- Fill in the MMS message slide by tapping Insert picture/video, Insert text here, and Insert audio.
- 5. When finished, tap Send.

For more information about composing and sending multimedia messages, refer to the "Exchanging Messages" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

18. Setting Up an Internet Email Account

Set up your personal email account such as Yahoo!® Mail Plus or AOL® on your phone.

- 1. On the Home screen, slide to the Email tab.
- 2. Tap Menu > Accounts > New Account at the bottom-right of the screen.
- 3. Enter your email address and password, and then tap Next.
- 4. Enter your name and the account display name, and then tap Next.
 Mail Setup then searches for the email provider settings on your phone.
 If the settings are not found on your phone, you will be prompted to enter the email account settings manually. Obtain the email account settings from your email provider.
- Tap the Automatic Send/Receive time, and then choose how frequently you want email messages to be automatically sent and downloaded on your phone.
- Select or clear an advanced setting according to your preference, and then tap Done.

To create and send an email message

- 1. On the right side of the Email tab, tap an email account that you want to use.
- 2. Tap to create a new email.
- Enter the email address of the recipient and the subject line.
- 4. Enter your email message, and then tap **Send**.

For more information about composing and sending email messages, refer to the "Exchanging Messages" chapter in the User Manual PDF.



19. Using Wi-Fi

If you have access to a wireless network, you can use Wi-Fi to connect your phone to the Internet.

To turn Wi-Fi on and connect to a Wi-Fi network

- 1. Tap **Start > Settings**, and then tap **Communications**.
- 2. Tap Wi-Fi. Detected wireless networks are displayed on the screen.
- 3. Tap the desired Wi-Fi network to connect to.
 - If you selected an open (unsecured) network, you are automatically connected to the network.
 - If you selected a secured network, enter the security key, and then tap **Done**.
 You are then connected to the network.



20. Mobile Internet

Experience desktop-like web surfing when using **Opera Mobile** to browse the Internet. You can also watch **YouTube** videos right on your phone.

Opera Mobile

- On the Home screen, slide to the Internet and Search tab, and then tap Launch Browser to launch Opera Mobile.
- Tap the address bar, enter the desired web site address, and then tap .
- To zoom in on a web page, double-tap the screen or slide your finger right on the zoom bar.

For more information about using Opera Mobile, refer to the "Internet" chapter on the User Manual PDF.



YouTube™

With the YouTube application, you can search, watch, and bookmark YouTube videos.

To open YouTube and watch a video

- 1. Tap Start > YouTube.
- 2. Tap a video on the screen to watch it.
- **3.** While watching a video, tap the screen to open the playback controls.

For more information about YouTube, refer to the "Internet" chapter on the User Manual PDF.



21. Bluetooth

To connect a Bluetooth hands-free or stereo headset

- Make sure that both your phone and the Bluetooth headset are turned on and within close range, and that the headset is visible. Refer to the Bluetooth headset documentation on how to set the headset in visible mode.
- 2. Tap Start > Settings, tap Communications, and then tap Bluetooth.
- **3.** Tap **Add new Bluetooth headset**. The phone scans for Bluetooth headsets within range.
- 4. Tap the name of the Bluetooth headset in the list to automatically pair it with your phone. When connected, appears at the right side of the Bluetooth headset name.
 Note If automatic pairing fails, manually enter the headset passcode when prompted.

If the Bluetooth stereo headset disconnects, turn the stereo headset on, repeat steps 1 and 2, then tap the stereo headset name under the Previously Paired Headsets section to reconnect.

To connect your phone with other Bluetooth devices

- Make sure that both your phone and the other Bluetooth device are turned on and within close range, and that the other device is visible. Refer to the Bluetooth device documentation on how to set it to visible mode.
- 2. Tap Start > Settings, and then tap Menu > Bluetooth Devices > Devices tab.
- Tap Add new device. Your phone then displays the names of other Bluetooth devices within range.
- 4. Tap the device name in the box, then tap Next.
- Specify a passcode to establish a secure connection. The passcode can be 1 up to 16 characters. Tap Next.
- Wait for the paired device to accept the partnership. The receiving party needs to enter the same passcode that you specified.
- The name of the paired device is then displayed. You may edit and enter a new name for that device.
- **8.** Select the check boxes of services that you want to use from the paired device, and then tap **Finish**.

22. Keeping Track of Appointments

Use the Calendar tab to create, edit, send, and view your appointments.

To create an appointment

- 1. On the Home screen, slide your finger to the Calendar tab.
- If you are creating an appointment for the current date, tap Menu > New.Otherwise, tap another date on the calendar, and then tap New Appointment.
- **3.** Enter a name for the appointment, then specify the location.
- 4. If there is a time frame for the appointment, set the start and end dates and times. If it is a special occasion such as a birthday or a whole-day event, set the All Day option to Yes.
- **5.** When finished, tap **OK** to return to the Calendar tab.

Tip Your upcoming appointments also appear on the Home tab.

To view and manage your appointments

On the Calendar tab, dates with appointments are indicated by a triangle (\blacksquare) at the upper-left corner of the date box.

- Tap a date on the calendar to switch to day view. The screen displays all your appointments and the weather information for that day, if available.
- 2. Tap an appointment to view its details. On the appointment details screen, tap **Menu** to edit, send, or delete the appointment.
- **3.** Tap **OK** to return to the day view.

For more information about using the Calendar tab, refer to the "Using the Home Screen" chapter in the User Manual PDF.



23. Capturing Photos and Recording Videos

Use the built-in 5.0 megapixel camera to capture photos and record videos.



To take a photo

- On the Home screen, slide to the **Photos and Videos** tab and then tap the camera icon ().
- 2. Aim the phone at the subject.
- 3. Tap the Virtual Camera button to activate auto-focus. When focus is set, the camera automatically takes the shot.

To shoot video

- On the Home screen, slide to the **Photos and Videos** tab and then tap the video icon ().
- 2. Aim the phone at the subject.
- 3. Tap the Virtual Camera button to activate auto-focus. When focus is set, the camera automatically starts capturing video. To stop capturing video, tap the Virtual Camera button again.

To learn more about the other capture modes and functions of the Camera, refer to the "Experiencing Multimedia" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

24. Viewing Photos and Videos

After capturing photos and video clips with the camera, you can visually browse through them on the **Photos and Videos** tab of the Home screen and view them in full screen.

Browsing through photos and videos

- 1. On the Home screen, slide to the Photos and Videos tab.
- 2. Flip through your photos and videos by swiping your finger upward or downward in the center of the screen.
- **3.** Tap a photo or video to open Album and view the media file in full screen.

Viewing photos in full screen


While in Album, use finger gestures to go to the next/previous media file, or the zoom bar to zoom in/out on a photo.



Go to the next or previous media file.




Zoom in on a photo using the zoom bar.

25. Connecting Your Phone to a Computer

Whenever you connect your phone to the computer with the USB cable, the Connect to PC screen displays and prompts you to choose the type of connection you want to use.



ActiveSync

Select this mode when you need to sync information and files between your phone and your computer. For more information about synchronizing data, see "Synchronizing Your Phone with Your Computer".

Disk Drive

This mode is available for selection only when there is a microSD storage card installed on your phone. Select this mode when you want to quickly copy files between your phone's storage card and your computer. see "Copying Files to the Storage Card".

Internet Sharing

When you do not have Internet access on your notebook or desktop computer, you can select this mode to use your phone as a modem for your computer. For more information about using Internet Sharing, see the "Internet" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

26. Synchronizing Your Phone with Your Computer

Set up synchronization software on your computer

On a Windows XP computer, you need to use **Microsoft ActiveSync® 4.5** or later. On a Windows Vista® computer, you need to use **Microsoft Windows Mobile® Device Center**.

If you do not have the software on your computer, go to the following website for information on downloading and installing Microsoft ActiveSync or Microsoft Windows Mobile Device Center to your computer: http://www.windowsmobile.com/getstarted.

To sync your phone with a Windows XP computer

- Connect your phone to your computer using the supplied USB cable. The Synchronization Setup Wizard automatically starts and guides you to create a synchronization partnership. Click Next.
- Clear the Synchronize directly with a server running Microsoft Exchange check box, and then click Next.
- 3. Select the information you want to sync, and then click **Next**.
- Select whether or not to allow wireless data connections on your phone while it is connected to the computer, and then click Next.
- 5. Click Finish.

To sync your phone with a Windows Vista computer

- Connect your phone to your computer using the supplied USB cable.
 Windows Mobile Device Center opens. On the screen, click Set up your device.
- 2. Select the information you want to sync and click **Next**.
- 3. Enter the name for your phone, and then click **Set Up**.

For more information on the types of information that can be synchronized between your phone and a computer, refer to the "Synchronizing Information" chapter in the User Manual PDF.

27. Copying Files to the Storage Card

Install a microSD™ card to your phone and have additional storage for files and programs. See "To install a microSD™ card" earlier in this Quick Start Guide for details.

To copy files from the computer to the storage card

- 1. Make sure that the storage card is properly installed on your phone.
- Connect the phone to your computer using the USB cable, select **Disk Drive** on the Connect to PC screen, and then tap **Done**.
- 3. On your computer, navigate to the removable disk drive, and then start copying files to the storage card.
- **4.** When finished, disconnect the phone from your computer.

If you want to copy media files such as music and videos from your computer to your phone, it is recommended that you use Windows Media Player to sync media files. See the next section for more information.


28. Synchronizing Music Files

Sync music files from your computer to your phone so you can listen to them while on the go.

- Connect your phone to your computer, and then open Windows Media® Player on your computer.
- 2. On the **Device Setup** dialog box, enter a name for your phone and click **Finish**.
- On the left panel of Windows Media® Player, right-click the name of your phone and click Set Up Sync.

Note You can also sync your storage card if you have one installed on your phone. To sync, right-click **Storage Card**.

- Select the music playlists that you want to sync between your computer and your phone and then click Add.
- Click Finish.



29. Listening to Music on Your Phone

After synchronizing music files to your phone, you can use the **Music** tab on the Home screen to play back music on your phone.

To listen to music

- 1. On the Home screen, slide to the Music tab.
- Browse through albums or music tracks within an album by swiping up or down on the screen, and then tap to start playing back the displayed song.


30. Resetting Your Phone

If you experience some sluggishness with your phone, you can perform a reset to shut down all programs and restart your phone.

To perform a soft reset

- 1. Pull out the stylus, then remove the back cover.
- Use the stylus tip to press the RESET button (red) located at the opening of the stylus bay.

Your phone restarts and displays the Home screen.



You can also perform a hard reset. After a hard reset, the phone is restored to its default settings—the way it was when you first purchased your phone and turned it on. Only Windows Mobile® software and other pre-installed programs will remain after a hard reset.


