






about this guide

This guide shows how to locate a menu feature. Press the Left and Right Soft Keys to select screen menus and options. Use the Navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\mathbf{O}} \cdot)$ to scroll and highlight menu features. Press the Center Select key $(\cdot \hat{\mathbf{\Phi}} \cdot)$ to select items.



Find it: Start > Call History > [Incoming Call]

This example shows that, from the main or Home Screen of the phone, you press the Left Soft Key to open the Start menu and then use the thumb wheel to scroll to **Call History** then highlight and select an incoming (**C**)call.

battery

battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

• Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty



does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.

- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your

battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.


Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

battery installation









battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. You can charge your battery by connecting the power supply to your phone's mini-USB port and plug into a wall outlet. Your phone



displays a full battery icon or **Charge Complete** when finished.

Tip: Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

Note: If your battery has been completely drained, it cannot be charged via the USB cable plugged into the computer (this connection will only maintain current battery life). Use a wall charger or car charger to recharge the battery. Some computer USB ports provide a higher current than others, and will provide more rapid charging.

Note: The mini-USB port does not support headphones. You must use 2.5mm headphones or a Bluetooth® stereo headset.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold the **Power/End** key (() until the display turns on.



To turn off your phone, press and hold the **Power/End** key (()) for 3 seconds.

carry the phone

It is best to carry your phone in an approved holster or case so that you do not damage it by placing it in your pocket, purse, or bag.

make a call

From the Home Screen, enter a phone number and press the **Call /Answer** key (ⓒ) to make a call. To learn how to use voice dialing, see page 79.

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press the Call/Answer key (()) or the Accept Left Soft Key to answer. To "hang up," press the Power/End key (()).

- If you are busy when a call comes in, press **Ignore** to send the call directly to voicemail.
- If you want to put a call on hold, press the Call/Answer key ((). To return to the call, press the Call/Answer key () again.

- If you are on a call and another incoming call comes in, you can choose to Answer the call or Wait. If you answer the call, the first call is put on hold and the second is active. If you choose Wait, the second call is directed to voicemail.
- To switch between the two active calls, press and hold the # key.

open a program

On the Home Screen and press **Start** to access the list of programs. Use the thumb wheel or navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\phi} \cdot)$ to scroll to a program. Then press the center select key $(\cdot \hat{\phi} \cdot)$ or thumb wheel to open the program.

your phone number

To view your phone number, press Start > Settings > More... > Phone Settings > My Telephone Number to see your number.

change between uppercase, lowercase, and caps lock

Your phone has a QWERTY Keypad, much like your computer keyboard. You can use it to



type e-mail and text messages, as well as enter contact information. Here are some basics: Press the **Caps** key (\uparrow) to change

between uppercase, lowercase, and caps lock within a text input mode. For more details regarding text input modes see page 55.

entering text and numbers

You enter text and numbers using the phone keypad. When you select a field that requires text or numbers, the phone automatically



selects the appropriate input mode. However, if you need to switch between modes, press the **ALT** key (^O). See the indicator at the top of the Home Screen to identify the current text mode setting. For details about the different text modes, see page 55.

undo/back key

To return to the previous screen or menu, press the **Undo/Back** key (see graphic) or use the **Back** key (←) on the keypad.



thumb wheel

To display a list of options on the Home Screen, use the thumb wheel to scroll through the menu.



infrared port

Use the infrared port to sync and exchange files with a PC or other infrared capable device.

Tip: Want to use

Bluetooth or USB Cable to transfer data? For Bluetooth transfer information see page 42. For data transfer using USB cable and ActiveSync®, see page 21.

removable memory capability

Note: A memory card is not included with your phone. It is sold separately.

You can use a removable miniSDTM memory card with your phone to store



multimedia content (such as music, pictures, videos).

Caution: Do not remove your memory card while your phone is using or writing files on it.

To insert a miniSDTM memory card:

- 1 Open memory slot cover. Place fingernail on bottom ridge of infrared port and lift rubber cover from the memory slot.
- 2 Insert memory card, with the contacts facing down, into the exposed memory slot.
- 3 Place memory card cover back in place and push to close.





Caution: Don't bend or scratch your memory card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Note: Move media files (pictures, videos, music) to a memory card as often as possible to save storage space on your phone.

lock & unlock phone

You can manually lock your phone to keep others from using it.

- 1 Press and hold the Home key (♠). The Quick List displays.
- 2 Highlight and select Device Lock.
- 3 Check the **Prompt if device unused for** check box, and select the amount of time for the phone to be inactive before automatically locking.

- 4 Choose either a simple password (4-digit number) or strong numeric (a hard-to-guess numeric PIN) password type.
- 5 Enter and confirm your password. Press the ALT key (♥) to switch to numeric mode.

Note: When you choose a password, it can only be a numeric value.

6 Press Done.

To unlock the phone, press **Unlock**. When the unlock screen displays, enter your password and press **Done**.

Tip: Be certain to remember your password.

Without your password, you can reset your phone, but it will result in the loss of your personalized settings and all content stored in phone memory. To perform a hard reset, hold down the center select key (s) for 5 seconds while turning the phone on.

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 72). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you **do not** need to unlock it to answer a call.

security auto phone lock

To enable an automatic phone lock so that your phone automatically locks after a specified time, use auto phone lock.

Find it: Start > Settings > More... > Security > Device Lock > Prompt if device unused for and select the number of minutes

lock & unlock keypad

Press and hold the Home key (♠). When the Quick List displays, highlight and select Key Lock. Once the keypad is locked, the Left Soft Key label changes to Unlock.

Tip: To quickly lock the keypad press the Home key (\clubsuit) and then the space bar.

To unlock the phone keypad, press **Unlock**. When the unlock screen displays, press the * key.

synchronize

You can synchronize the information on your phone in two ways, over the air (OTA) or using a cable and your computer.

sync over the air

To sync your phone over the air (OTA) you must sync it directly with your company's Microsoft Information Server or Microsoft Exchange Server 2003. For more information about this set-up see Additional Information on page 90 and the Motorola Q Support website at: http://www.motorola.com/support/Q.

You can also contact your system administrator to set up this synchronization.

Note: If you are out of network coverage, and your phone tries to sync 3 times without finding a network, your synchronization settings automatically revert to manual synchronization. To set your synchronization schedule back to the desired frequency, you will need to reset the **Schedule** option in the ActiveSync® settings (On the Home screen press **Start > ActiveSync > Menu > Schedule**).

sync with a computer

Note: For information about connections (Bluetooth®, VPN, and web browser), see page 85.

You can use Microsoft® ActiveSync® version 4.1 or above to synchronize information between your phone and desktop computer. ActiveSync compares your phone's contact information, calendar appointments, e-mail messages, and media files to those on your computer and then updates to the most recent information.

installing and setting up ActiveSync

To synchronize information on your phone with a PC, you must install Microsoft ActiveSync software on your computer.

Caution: Verify the minimum requirements for your computer and the operating system on the CD-ROM sleeve or Microsoft Mobile

Phone website

(http://www.microsoft.com/windowsm obile) before installing the software.

Note: If you do not have a CD-ROM, you can download the latest ActiveSync software from the Microsoft Windows Mobile website (http://www.microsoft.com/windowsm obile).

- **1** Install ActiveSync on your PC.
- 2 After setup completes, connect your phone to the PC. The phone drivers install on your computer and then the Sync Setup Wizard automatically starts.
- **3** Follow the instructions on the screen to complete the wizard.

Note: You can configure an Exchange Server connection to synchronize directly with Exchange Server and Outlook e-mail clients. The Sync Setup Wizard will prompt you for

the name of the Exchange Server, your user name, password, and domain name. If you don't have this information available, you can contact your company's system administrator to setup your phone or see Additional Information on page 90 and the Motorola Q Support website at:

http://www.motorola.com/support/Q.

When you finish the wizard, ActiveSync starts to synchronize automatically with your phone. Once synchronization completes, you can disconnect your phone from your PC.

Note: You may need to restart your computer.

synchronizing via a cable connection

Once ActiveSync is installed on your PC, you can connect it to your phone and sync.

Turn on the phone.



2 Connect your phone to your PC using a USB cable.



Note: For more detailed information, see "Connecting a mobile device to a PC" in ActiveSync Help on your PC, the Microsoft Web Site for ActiveSync or the Motorola Q Support web site at http://www.motorola.com/support/Q.

synchronizing via Bluetooth

After ActiveSync is installed on your PC, you can connect it to your phone and sync via Bluetooth.

Note: In order to use this feature, your PC must be equipped with Bluetooth or a Bluetooth PC adaptor accessory.

- 1 Follow the instructions in ActiveSync Help for configuring Bluetooth on your PC to support ActiveSync.
- 2 Turn on the phone.
- 3 On your phone, verify that Bluetooth is turned on (Press Start > Bluetooth > Bluetooth Manager > Settings. Toggle Status to Bluetooth On).
- 4 Press Start > ActiveSync.
- 5 Select Menu > Connect via Bluetooth. Ensure that the phone and PC are within close range.

- 6 If this is the first time you have connected to this PC via Bluetooth, you must complete the Bluetooth wizard on the phone and set up a Bluetooth partnership with the PC before synchronizing.
- 7 Select Sync.
- 8 When finished, select Menu > Disconnect Bluetooth.
- **9** To preserve battery power on your phone, turn off Bluetooth (see page 42).

synchronizing via infrared

After ActiveSync is installed on your PC, you can connect it to your phone and sync via infrared.

Note: To use this feature, your PC must be equipped with infrared capability. Turn on the phone.
 On your phone, verify that IR is turned on (Press Start > Settings > Connections > Beam and

receive infrared signals.

- select **Receive incoming beams**).
- 4 Line up the infrared (IR) port on your phone and PC so that they are unobstructed and within close range.

Follow the instructions in ActiveSync Help

on the PC for setting up your PC to

- 5 Press Start > ActiveSync.
- 6 Select Menu > Connect via IR.
- 7 Select Sync.

e-mail & messages

Note: You can set up e-mail with your company's Microsoft Exchange Server 2003. Contact your system administrator for the required e-mail set-up information or see page 27 or the Motorola Q Support website at: http://www.motorola.com/support/Q.

setting up e-mail

You can set up an e-mail on your phone to check and send messages. There are two ways to set up e-mail: automatically or manually. If you have a Hotmail or Pocket MSN account, see Hotmail E-mail Setup on page 27.

automatic e-mail set up

Some e-mail providers allow for automatic e-mail set up. Have your e-mail address, username, and password ready and:

- 1 Press Start > Messaging > Outlook E-mail.
- $\label{eq:linear} \textbf{2} \quad \text{Select Menu} > \textbf{Options} > \textbf{New Account}.$
- 3 In Your name, enter your display name for e-mail messages.
- 4 In E-mail address, enter the e-mail address for this account.
- 5 Select Attempt to obtain e-mail settings from the Internet and select Next.

Note: If the account sets up successfully, you will be prompted to send and receive e-mail. If not, you must click **Next** and see the next section.

manual e-mail accounts settings

If you tried to automatically set up your account and were prompted for detailed e-mail settings, call your e-mail (internet) service provider for additional information. **Note:** You will need the following information from your e-mail provider: Domain, Server type (POP3 or IMAP4), Account name, Incoming mail server (POP3 or IMAP4), Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) connection requirements, and Outgoing mail server (SMTP) to complete the set up.

1 Press Start > Messaging > Outlook E-mail.



- 2 Select Menu > Options > New Account.
- 3 In Your name, enter your display name for e-mail messages.
- 4 In E-mail address, enter the e-mail address for this account.
- 5 Select Next.
- 6 Enter the information from the e-mail (Internet) service provider as appropriate until setup is complete, and click **Finish**.

Caution: If you save your password and then lose your phone, someone finding your phone may gain access to your e-mail.

Exchange server e-mail setup



If you do not have specific Exchange Server information for your company's e-mail, contact your company's system administrator to setup your phone, otherwise, use these steps:

- 1 Press Start > ActiveSync.
- 2 Press Menu > Configure Server.
- 3 In Server Address, enter the exchange server address.

Note: You might be required to check if this server requires an encrypted (SSL) connection.

4 Press Next.

- 5 In User Name, enter your user name for the e-mail account
- 6 In Password, enter the password for the account.

Tip: If you want to save your password, so you don't have to enter it again, select the check box to **Save Password**.

- 7 Select Next.
- 8 In Domain, enter the server's domain name (if necessary).
- 9 Press Next.
- **10** Choose the data you want to synchronize. You can select Contacts, Calendar, E-mail, and Tasks.
- 11 Press Finish.
- **12** Press **Sync** to synchronize your phone with the Exchange server.

Note: If you don't have some or all of the information requested in these steps, contact your company's system administrator to setup your phone or see the information available in Additional Information on page 90 or the Motorola Q Support website at: http://www.motorola.com/support/0.

This device uses the enhanced version of Microsoft Windows Mobile 2005 known as Mobile Security Feature Pack (MSFP).

This enhanced version supports a type of over-the-air communication with your corporate e-mail servers known as "IP-PUSH'.

IP-PUSH will keep your Moto-Q and corporate mailbox synchronized at all times with absolutely minimal delays. It will do this for e-mail, calendar entries, contacts, and tasks.

To benefit from the enhanced capabilities of IP-PUSH you will need to consult your corporate IT staff. IP-PUSH may require some set-up and adjustments to your corporate technical infrastructure. Another name for MSFP is Adaptation Kit Update-2 (AKU2).

Hotmail e-mail setup



If you use the Hotmail or MSN e-mail services, have your e-mail address, and password ready and:

- 1 Press Start > Pocket MSN.
- 2 Select MSN Hotmail.
- 3 In E-mail address, enter the e-mail address for your account.
- 4 In Password, enter the password for the account.

5 Select Sign In.

If the Hotmail account completes set up correctly, your e-mail files and account folders will be synchronized with your phone. **Tip:** After you set up your Hotmail e-mail account, you won't need to do it again.

operator hosted e-mail

If you have Operator Hosted E-mail, please contact your operator, or access their web site in order to get information about their hosted e-mail solution, and its compatibility with Windows Mobile® 5.0 enabled devices.

receive & read messages

When you receive a message your phone plays an alert and displays **New Message** with a message indicator such as 🖂.

Find it: Start > Messaging > E-mail account

Tip: If you do not see a list of messages, press Menu > Folders > Inbox. To return to the Folder list, press the Back key (\leftarrow).

To read a message:

To open the next message in the list from within an open message, press the navigation key $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{o}} \cdot$ to the right; to open the previous message in the list, press the navigation key $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{o}} \cdot$ to the left.

Note: You can send, read, and receive PDF, Microsoft Word, Excel, and PowerPoint files via e-mail, but you cannot edit these files on your phone. Use ActiveSync to transfer these files to your computer for editing.

message options

To delete, save, reply, or forward the messages, use these quick steps from the Inbox with a message selected or when viewing a message:

- To delete, press Menu > Delete.
- To reply, press Menu > Reply or Reply All. Enter the message and press Send.



- To forward, press **Menu** > **Forward**. Enter the message and press **Send**.
- To create a contact card for the sender, press Menu > Save to Contacts.

Tip: Need to check your e-mail right now? Press Start > Messaging. Select the account to send and receive messages and press Menu > Send/Receive. The phone connects to your Internet e-mail server and sends and receives your messages.To stop this process, press Menu > Stop Send/Receive.

send a message

You can send SMS text messages and e-mail messages can contain pictures, animations, sounds, videos, PDFs, compressed files, word processing and spreadsheet files.

Find it: Start > **Messaging** > **Text Messages** or *E-mail* Account

To send a text message:

1 Press New.

2 For e-mail, in To, Cc, and/or Bcc, enter e-mail addresses. Insert a semicolon (;) between multiple numbers or addresses.

For text messages, enter contact telephone number.

Tip: You can quickly enter phone numbers or e-mail addresses from your contact cards. In **To**, press **Enter** (\leftarrow) and select a recipient from the list. Then select the recipient's phone number or e-mail address.

- **3** Use the keypad to compose a message.
- 4 Press Send.

Tip: In an e-mail you can insert a picture, voice note or file in the message, on the message area press Menu > Insert > Picture or Voice Note or File.

Note: If you select to insert a voice note into the message, you will also need to record it. Press **Record** and start speaking into the phone's microphone. When finished speaking, press **Stop** and then **Done**.

To set the priority for an e-mail message, press Menu > Message Options.

To cancel a message, press Menu > Cancel Message.

global address look up

You can view a global address list (GAL) on the Exchange Server on your phone. This means you can find a contact's phone number or e-mail without having to store the information directly to your phone.

Note: GAL information can only be viewed during a data transfer session; the entire GAL cannot be stored for viewing offline.

GAL Lookup can be found from Contacts and Contact Chooser. Contact Chooser is found in Messaging, Phone, Calendar and Speed Dial.

Here's how to use GAL to search for a contact:

- 1 Press Start > Contacts.
- 2 In the contact list, press Menu > Find Online.

3 Scroll through the list of entries displayed. When you locate your contact, press the **Call/Answer** key (③) to make a call.

Note: Although the entire GAL cannot be stored on your phone, after the contact is found, you can add the single contact to your contact list.

Tip: You can also choose to send a message, SMS or e-mail to a contact found using GAL. In a new message or e-mail, press Menu > Find Online. When you locate the contact to send a message, highlight and select it. The e-mail information is populated into the To: Field.

messaging quick reference

Note: Make sure you have an e-mail provider and the following account information: ISP settings, protocols, user id, password, and sending and receiving host information. Otherwise, you might not get these features to work.

features send text message **Find it:** Start > Messaging > Text Messages > New



features

create and send e-mail

Find it: Start > Messaging > Outlook E-mail > E-mail Account > New



Tip: Remember you must have your e-mail set up to send an e-mail (see page 24).

To add a picture, voice note, or file in an e-mail message, in the message area press Menu > Insert > Picture or Voice Note or File

Tip: You can save a draft of a message that you are composing to finish and send later. Press **Menu > Save to Drafts**. A draft of the message is stored in the Drafts folder of the account you are in.

features

create and add e-mail signature

Find it: Start > Messaging > Outlook E-mail > *E-mail Account*

Press Menu > Options > Signatures

Scroll to the account for which you are creating the signature. Select **Use signature with this account**.

Select the Signature box, enter your signature, and press **Done**.

Tip: To insert a signature in every message you send, select **Include when replying and forwarding**. Otherwise, a signature is inserted only in new messages.

read new messages



To quickly view new messages, click the message notification area on the Home Screen.

features

view attachment



While viewing the message, use the center select key (•) to select the attachment.

Tip: If you are replying to an e-mail in the Outlook e-mail account, you will send less data if you do not edit the original message. This may reduce data transfer costs based on your rate plan.

download message objects

If an e-mail message includes an attachment, when you open the message, the name of the attachment will appear highlighted. To download the attachment, click the highlighted attachment name. The attachment is downloaded the next time you synchronize or connect to your e-mail server.

Note: If there are multiple attachments in the message, all attachments are downloaded.

insert a media object in an e-mail

To add a picture, voice note, or file in an e-mail message, in the composing message area press Menu > Insert > Picture or Voice Note or File.

download complete e-mail messages

Menu > Download Message

The complete message is retrieved the next time you synchronize or connect to your e-mail server and send and receive e-mail.

Bluetooth® wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless *pairing* (also called *linking* or *bonding*). You can pair your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit, or pair your phone with a computer to exchange and synchronize files.

Note: The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in

certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

turn Bluetooth power on or off

If Bluetooth **Power** is **On**, your phone can automatically pair with the handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device or move it near the phone.

To turn Bluetooth on: Press Start > Bluetooth > Bluetooth Manager > Settings then toggle Status to Bluetooth ON.

The Bluetooth indicator 🚯 displays in the Home Screen.

Note: To extend battery life, use the previous procedure to set Bluetooth **Power** to **OFF** when not in use. Your phone will not pair with devices until you set Bluetooth **Power** back to **ON** and pair your phone with the devices again.

pair with a headset or handsfree device

Before you try to pair your phone with a device, make sure your phone's Bluetooth power is **on** and the device is **on** and **ready** in *pairing* or *bonding* mode (see the device user's guide). You can pair your phone with multiple devices, but only use it with one headset device at a time.

Your phone lists the devices it finds within range.

- 1 Press Start > Bluetooth > Bluetooth Manager > Hands-free.
- 2 Put the device (handsfree headset, stereo headset, keyboard, etc.) in pairing mode.
- 3 Press Add. The phone prompts you to verify your device is ready. Press Search.
- 4 Select the device from the list.

5 If prompted, enter the device passkey (such as 0000) and press the **Accept** key.

When the devices are paired, an icon appears on the Home Screen in the Bluetooth Task Tray.

Tip: For specific information about the Bluetooth device you are using with your phone, refer to the instructions that came with it.

send objects to another device

You can use Bluetooth pairing to send Outlook e-mail, contacts, tasks, calendar items, audio, ring tones, pictures, video, and voice notes from your phone to a computer or other device.

- 1 Press Start > Bluetooth > BT Send Object.
- 2 Select the object type and object you want to send.

Tip: To select an item, press the center select key $(\hat{•})$.

3 Press Send.

- 4 Select the name of the device to send the file.
- 5 To cancel sending an item, press Menu > Cancel.

use your phone as a PC remote

You can use Bluetooth and your phone as a remote control for your computer. For example, want to watch a video on your computer and use your phone as a remote control? Use PC Remote and control when the video plays, stops, or pauses.

- 1 On your computer, turn Bluetooth on.
- 2 On your phone, press Start > Bluetooth > PC Remote.

- 3 Press the Add Left Soft Key.
- 4 On the your computer, launch the Bluetooth devices applet from the Control Panel and click Add.

modem-link

Note: You must have Multiple Network Access Identifier (MNAI) software on your phone and MNAI service enabled in your account for dial up networking functionality to work on your phone. Call your phone service provider for more information regarding account services.

You can use your phone as a modem to dial in to a network. You can do this using Bluetooth or using a USB cable.

When your phone is a modem, e-mail, web browsing, ActiveSync, and text messaging services will be suspended until the modem-link is deactivated.

using Bluetooth

To use Bluetooth to modem-link to a network:

Note: You must have a computer that has Bluetooth capabilities for modem-link to work via Bluetooth.

- On your computer, in the Bluetooth window menu bar, select the "Connections" menu, "Dial-up Networking" and then "Find devices."
- 4 The computer finds your phone and displays the dial up networking window.

Now you can use your phone as a modem to connect to a service provider or network.

using a cable

To use a USB cable with your phone to connect with modem-link to a network, first you must install networking drivers onto your computer. Before starting the set up:

- DO NOT connect your data cable to your phone and computer.
- Note your phone's ESN number (located behind the battery in the phone)

- Contact your service provided for your account user name
- 1 Place the provided Companion CD into the CD Drive on your computer. The Companion CD Installation wizard window automatically displays.
- 2 On your computer, click "Applications" and then "Dial-Up Networking Software."
- **3** Follow the prompts as directed to install the drivers onto your computer.

Then you need to enable modem-link on your phone and install phone drivers:

- 1 On your phone, press Start > Accessories > Modem-link > Activate > OK.
- **2** Using the USB data cable, connect the phone to your PC.

3 When a window displays prompting for the device driver, select "Install the software automatically" and press "Next."

The driver is installed on your computer and ready for setting up a network connection.

Note: If you do not have the Companion CD, or want the latest version of the device and computer drivers, go to http://www.motorola.com/support/Q and click "User Support Dial-up Networking."

To establish a new network connection, on your computer:

- **3** Follow the prompts to connect to the Internet using a modem:
 - Network Connection Type: Connect to the Internet
 - Getting Ready: Set up My Connection Manually
 - Internet Connection: Connect using a dial-up modem
 - Select a Device: Smartphone wireless USB Modem (Deselect any other modems)
 - Connection Name: Type a connection name (can be any name).
 - Number to Dial: **#777**
 - Connection Availability: Anyone's Use
 - User Name: get this information from your service provider

• Password: get this information from your service provider

Note: Be aware of these items:

- If you do not plan to use your phone as the default Internet connection, then do **not** check **Make this the default Internet connection**.

- To enter numbers quickly, press Alt key (♥), to switch to ALT or number mode.

Tip: If a field permits a numeric entry only, like a phone number, the input mode automatically defaults to secondary key entry mode.

• To start a new line, press Enter (↩).

iTAP®

iTAP lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it. This feature is integrated into your phone's software and is automatically set. If you want to turn off this setting press **Start > Settings > Text Input Settings** and uncheck **Text Prediction**.

If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

numeric mode

Press **Alt** key to activate the secondary key mode (top keypad symbols) and enter the numbers you want.

symbol mode

Press the **Alt** key and then the **Caps** key (\uparrow) . The Symbol page displays. Highlight the symbol you want and press **Select**.

volume

Press and hold the thumb wheel to adjust earphone, speaker, or headset volume.

> Need to change profiles on the



fly? On the Home Screen, scroll to and select **Profile**. Choose from **Normal**, **Silent**, **Meeting** and others.

• Want to turn off a sound? Press **Start** > **Settings** > **Sounds**. Highlight the desired item and select the sound you want to associate with that item.

Tip: You can eliminate the ringer volume instantly when an incoming call comes in-just use the thumb wheel to turn the ringer off.

handsfree speaker

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker on calls without holding the phone to your ear.

During a call, press the Voice key (see graphic) or press Menu > Speakerphone On.



Your phone displays **Spkrphone On** until you turn it off or end the call.

Note: The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a car kit or headset.

voice commands

You can use voice commands to make calls, and to open and use some phone applications.

Note: Not all phone languages support voice recognition and voice commands.

open applications

To open a call a contact, send a text message, look up contact information or open a program:

1 Press and hold the voice key for 2 seconds.

Your phone prompts you to say a command.

- 2 Say one of the following commands:
 - "Call <contact name or phone number>"

- "Send text <contact name>"
- "Look up <contact name>"
- "Open <program name>"

Your phone will respond to the request by making a call, opening a text message screen, open the contact information for requested contact, or open the program.

Tip: Speak numbers at a normal speed and volume, pronouncing each digit distinctly. Avoid pausing between digits.

Notes:

- Your phone may prompt you to repeat a name or number. If the name/number isn't valid, the phone doesn't make the call.
- If the phone does not recognize the name or number, the display shows a list of names/numbers, asks, "Did you

say ...," and highlights the first item in the list. Say "Yes" to call the highlighted number, or "No" to go to the next list item.

To select the name or number manually, scroll to the name/number on the list and press the **Select** key.

flight mode

You can put your phone in flight mode to safely access your address book, games, camera, and music in areas where cellular network access is prohibited (i.e. during airline flights and in hospitals).

To turn flight mode on or off: Press and hold the Home key (\clubsuit). The Quick List displays. Highlight and select Wireless Manager. Scroll to **Phone** and press the center select key (\cdot). When the **Phone** button turns to the lighter color, it is turned off.

Tip: You can also user **Wireless Manager** to turn off Bluetooth. Press and hold the Home key (\clubsuit) . The Quick List displays. Highlight and select Wireless Manager. Scroll to **Bluetooth** and press the center select key (\clubsuit) . When the button turns to the lighter color, it is turned off

media player

A version of Windows Media Player Mobile version 10.2 or higher for Smartphone is available on your to phone to play digital audio and video files that are stored on your phone or on the Web.

By default, Windows Media Player Mobile can play the following types of files: Windows Media Audio (WMA), Windows Media Video (WMV), and Motion Picture Experts Group-2 Audio Layer-3 (MP3).

Find it: Press Start > Windows Media



- To play or pause a music or video file, press Enter (~).
- To skip to the previous or next file, press the navigation key (••,•) left or right.

 To increase or decrease the volume, press the navigation key (••\$\overline\$•) up or down.

Tip: If you need to turn the sound off, press #.

- To switch to full screen video playback, press ①.
- To fast forward or rewind, press and hold the navigation key (••••) left or right.

Tip: Do you want to play a song or video on the Internet or network? Use the Open URL command. From the Library screen press **Menu > Open URL** (if you need to get to the Library screen, in Windows Media, press **Menu > Library**). For more information about downloading or copying video files see page 41.

set video controls

You can set up keys on your phone to control the media player.

- 1 From the media player screen, press the Menu Right Soft Key and select Options.
- 2 Select Buttons.
- **3** Scroll to the media player action you want to assign a button or key press.
- 4 Press the Menu Right Soft Key and choose, Assign, Reset, or None.

audio enhancement

Your phone allows you to adjust surround sound, bass, and clarity levels for the phone speakers as well as your headset.

Note: If you are adjusting headset audio, make sure you wear your headset when adjusting audio levels. You can also set the speaker size for your particular headset.

web browser

You can use Internet Explorer Mobile to search and view the web.

Find it: Press Start > Internet Explorer



Note: Not all web file formats are supported.

• To go to a web page, press Menu > Address Bar. Enter the address and press Go.

- Change connection options, press Menu > Tools > Options > Connections.
- To show/hide pictures, press Menu > View > Show Pictures.
- To add web address to your Favorites, open the web page and press Menu > Add to Favorites.

file manager

You can use File Manager to sort, view, copy, and move files on your phone. Files you might want to use in file manager include text, pictures, music, and video files.

Find it: Start > File Manager

task manager

Want to see what programs are running (active) on your phone? Use the Task Manager to see the programs, or stop a specific program from running.

Find it: Start > System Tools > \top ask Manager

Tip: Need to stop running program? In **Task Manager**, select the program and press **Menu** > **Kill**.

This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg.¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.11 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.47 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).²

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines. External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Product Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola, keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

- Use your mobile device to call for help. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic

accident, or medical emergencies.*

- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.*
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.*
