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


Fig. 1. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values






Fig. 2. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values

Fig. 4. Forward current as a function of forward voltage; typical values






Fig. 6. Diode capacitance as a function of reverse voltage; typical values

Fig. 5. Reverse current as a function of reverse voltage; typical values







FR4 PCB, mounting pad for cathode 1 cm² $T_i = 175$ °C






Fig. 11. Average forward current as a function of ambient temperature; typical values

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


11. Test information




